Kiribati national priorities on climate change adaptation

- KAP II project investing in water and coastal sectors. KAP III includes disaster risk reduction focusing on communities
- NAPA II project agriculture, fisheries and food security
- GEF SGPKi community small scale projects on water, sanitation, coastal and conservation
- Italian funded projects renewable energy on outer islands





Achievements

- Climate change is reflected in the Kiribati Development Plan 2008 - 2011
- KAP II project with the World Bank
- GEF SGPKi funded community projects
- Italian funded climate change projects
- Mangrove planting initiatives
- Establishment of PIPA
- New sectoral plans and policies integrate climate change including water and sanitation policies

Challenges

- Technical capacity
- Lack of reliable climate data and information
- Coordination of national activities and programmes
- Awareness to village level communities
- Lack of leadership across the sectors
- Lack of predictable resources to supplement the needs
- Growing complexity of emerging political climate change issues

- National and regional initiatives including the Centre of Excellence for Atoll Agriculture Research and Development in the Pacific with SPC
