Facts on the PIPA




- 1. The PIPA stands for the Phoenix Islands Protected Area;
- 2. The Republic of Kiribati is made up of 3 main groups of islands: The Gilbert Islands (where Tarawa the capital is), the Line Islands (where Christmas Island is) and the Phoenix Islands where the PIPA is;
- 3. There are 8 islands in the Phoenix Islands or in the PIPA;
- 4. The size of the PIPA is 408,250 sq.km;
- 5. PIPA is the first MPA of this huge scale ever created by the Government of Kiribati in 2006;


Unique features of the PIPA

- 6. PIPA stands as the biggest and deepest Marine Protected Area in the UNESCO World Heritage Sites from 2010;
- 7. One island in the PIPA is Nikumaroro known as the graveyard of the American Aviation Legend, Amelia Earhart whose airplane claimed to have collapsed 20 miles southwest of Nikumaroro;
- 8. PIPA is the first MPA covering 8 atoll islands with land plants, animals and birds, 2 submerged reef systems, the entire coral systems, the numerous seamounts and the deep-seas;
- 9. PIPA is the MPA that looks at conservation as another approach to attaining economic growth through the PIPA Trust Fund arrangements and Eco-Tourism;

10. "PIPA is the Pride of Kiribati!"

Kiribati is a country without any landbased resources but only relies entirely on the sea and its resources for its survival and development. The PIPA is really a sacrifice and is known globally as Kiribati's Gift to Humanity.
