The Climate and Development Ministerial provides a platform for countries and institutions championing solutions for enhancing and scaling adaptation finance for LDCs and SIDS. The 2025 Ministerial comes at a decisive moment as COP30 seeks to elevate adaptation as a global priority and unlock the political will and financing needed to build a more resilient future for all. This event will build on the lived experience of SIDS who are leading adaptation-focused and country-owned programmes (options include Vanuatu, Madagascar blue bond, V20 climate prosperity plans, Barbados) and work undertaken by the C&DM to develop an Action Toolkit for Country Platforms.</p> <p>The event will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Explore what it would take for Country Platforms to effectively mobilise finance and elevate them as vehicles for adaptation investment. ▪ Discuss how we can ensure the resources are allocated where they are needed most, including for those countries and projects which struggle to attract private sector and MDB finance? ▪ Debate what this means for the delivery of the new global climate finance goal to mobilise \$1.3 trillion per year? ▪ The event aims to foster a deeper understanding of the obstacles and opportunities in scaling up adaptation programmatic approaches finance, and to identify practical steps to take for overcoming them. <p>Panel (tbc) : Minister Regenvanu (Vanuatu Government), UK Government or other donor country), V20 , LIFE-AR.</p>

Rooted in the unique geopolitical and climate realities of the Pacific, the training aimed to strengthen youth leadership, foster intergenerational collaboration with senior negotiators and regional stakeholders, and build trust in multilateral climate processes. The training also contributed to strengthening regional networks and to ground capacity-building in both traditional knowledge and technical negotiation skills, YNA is supporting a new generation of Pacific diplomats ready to shape just and future-proof outcomes for people and planet.</p> <p>This side event features the progress towards Pacific SIDS young negotiators representation in multilateral climate diplomacy through the support of the YNA and meaningful partnerships with institutions across the region. It will reflect on lessons from the regional training, share the experiences of Pacific youth negotiators, and explore how intergenerational and regionally grounded leadership can enhance the effectiveness, legitimacy, and ambition of climate justice.</p>

While global military spending reached USD 2.7 trillion in 2024, climate finance for Pacific SIDS remains in the low billions. Militaries are responsible for an estimated 5.5% of global greenhouse gas emissions yet remain exempt from mandatory reporting under the Paris Agreement.</p> <p>Community perspectives will underscore how demilitarisation is essential to achieving the 1.5°C limit, strengthening resilience rooted in culture and traditional knowledge, and safeguarding peace and security in the Pacific. The discussion will also spotlight Pacific initiatives such as the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty, which is gaining global momentum as a concrete pathway to phase out fossil fuels, accelerate a just transition, and advance both climate justice and peace for Pacific peoples.</p>

These islands (all outer islands including Line and Phoenix) face increasing threats from sea-level rise, prolonged droughts, coastal erosion, and extreme weather events, making adaptation a national priority.</p> <p>KORIAP focuses on delivering climate-resilient infrastructure, improving water security, enhancing disaster preparedness, and supporting sustainable livelihoods. Climate finance mechanisms continue to scale, and adaptation strategies provide clear guidance for what actions must be taken. However, communities across the region, who are at the frontline of climate crisis, are often under-supported to participate fully in resilience initiatives. Since 2021, Live & Learn has piloted a community-led, strengths-based and systems approach to resilience through the Climate Resilient Islands (CRI) programme, funded by the New Zealand government. Ports, vital to national supply chains, faces direct physical damages. These varies from conventional berths, piers to small wharves, boat ramps and jetties, designed to manage modest volume of cargo typical for island economies. Pacific SIDS ports face range of acute and chronic climate risks, and significant geophysical risks. Acute climatic events can lead to immediate and severe damages and disrupt services. Just one major event can obliterate years of infrastructure investments and halt essential imports. Chronic climate risks threaten to permanently submerge low-lying port facilities, degrade structural integrity and compromise functionality of navigation channels. Seismic and tsunami events, though infrequent, pose catastrophic outcomes. With overlapping climate and geophysical risk, ports are among most at-risk critical infrastructures. These interconnected risks compound economic vulnerabilities and raise long-term adaptation costs, making resilience planning difficult for smaller SIDS with limited resources. This necessitates coordinated, whole-of-region approaches to prioritize resilience investments informed by systematic risk assessments and scenario planning in strengthening preparedness and disaster resilience of ports in Pacific SIDS.
