The new assessment on climate change implications for fisheries and aquaculture marks a critical milestone for the Pacific Islands, providing the most significant update since the original 2011 study. Led by the Pacific Community (SPC) with support from the Governments of Australia and New Zealand, the assessment brings together the expertise of more than 50 scientists and practitioners from 36 institutions.

This landmark report reflects the latest science on how climate change is already transforming, and will increasingly shape, the future of Pacific fisheries and aquaculture. It presents projections to 2050 and beyond, building on the most recent findings of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC).

The analysis spans coastal, oceanic, and freshwater fisheries, as well as aquaculture systems, detailing the vulnerabilities and risks these vital sectors face. Each country chapter, including the one enclosed here, provides a tailored assessment of national exposure to climate impacts, alongside implications for food security, livelihoods, and economic resilience.

Many strategies are already in motion to strengthen national resilience, safeguard marine resources, and sustain blue economies. Ports, vital to national supply chains, faces direct physical damages. These varies from conventional berths, piers to small wharves, boat ramps and jetties, designed to manage modest volume of cargo typical for island economies. Pacific SIDS ports face range of acute and chronic climate risks, and significant geophysical risks. Acute climatic events can lead to immediate and severe damages and disrupt services. Just one major event can obliterate years of infrastructure investments and halt essential imports. Chronic climate risks threaten to permanently submerge low-lying port facilities, degrade structural integrity and compromise functionality of navigation channels. Seismic and tsunami events, though infrequent, pose catastrophic outcomes. With overlapping climate and geophysical risk, ports are among most at-risk critical infrastructures. These interconnected risks compound economic vulnerabilities and raise long-term adaptation costs, making resilience planning difficult for smaller SIDS with limited resources. This necessitates coordinated, whole-of-region approaches to prioritize resilience investments informed by systematic risk assessments and scenario planning in strengthening preparedness
